Pastor's Note: May 2025

"You shall love your neighbor as yourself."



With May comes Mother's Day; Happy Mother's Day to all of you who are mothers or who had mothers (I trust that covers everyone). When I taught confirmation and got to the commandment to "Honor your father and your mother . . .", I asked the class, "How many of you came into this world on your own?" The answer is of course obvious, but the implication isn't always grasped: we are all inherently dependent on others!

We are all dependent on others, not only for birth and growing up, but also for education, friendship, work, and citizenship. We are part of a web of relationships which support us and through which we support others. Who we are is shaped by others and we influence who others are and become. In the words of the poet, John Donne (1572-1631), "No man is an island, entire of itself. Each is a piece of the continent, a part of the main . . ."

Given the American cultural belief in 'rugged individualism', we often lose track of this simple truth. This doesn't mean we have to be 'controlled' by others, but we are accountable to them. It doesn't mean we have to 'agree' with others, but it does mean we have to show respect for them.

It does not mean we have to take on the feelings of others, but it does mean we have to exercise enough empathy to understand where they are coming from as if we were in their situation. Some religious conservatives have even argued that empathy can be "sinful" if we extend it to groups of people with which we have no personal connection; "the poor" or "immigrants". This view involves a fundamental misunderstanding of what empathy is.

In a time when people are cutting off friends and relatives because of their political positions, attacking others for having a different religion, or seeing people from other countries or races as threats, we need to be intentional about remembering our human connectedness.

This includes immigrants, even ones who enter our country illegally. It doesn't mean we have to let people enter illegally, but it does mean we have to treat them as human beings with whom we have a basic human connection. This is manifestly *not* happening today. ICE has lost even basic human decency in its treatment of immigrants, seizing people simply for the color of their skin or heritage!

If we truly honor Motherhood, we cannot treat immigrants as sub-human. Whatever we think about this issue, whatever we think needs to be done about illegal immigration, we must not lose track of the basic truth that we are all connected as human beings. If we lose track of this truth, we lose our humanness.

Seder Dinner for Easter Week

On Maundy Thursday, April 17, St. Paul's hosted a cultural dinner with s Passover Seder in the Jewish tradition. Pastor Kent led the Seder that had some of the same rituals as Jesus and his disciples experienced at the Last Supper. Pastor Kent incorporated our Communion service with Matzah (unleavened bread) and grape juice.

Participants brought assorted dishes to share from our Seder Recipe Book. Our dinner included lamb au jus, pot roast, brisket, lemon potatoes, roasted chicken, and candied carrots. Everyone pitched in to set up the dinner with Shayla's eye for beauty, the white linen tablecloths were set with assorted candles and little sipping glasses for the grape juice.


The Pastor and Lani arranged the Seder plate with the six foods representing the plight of the Jews escaping from Egypt and their slave years. As the pastor said the prayers, we toasted with four glasses of juice. A seder isn't complete without songs, so Deanna fired up the organ in the Fellowship Hall and played the first hymn and ran up to the church balcony and cranked the volume up for the last hymn. In turn participants ate matzah sandwiches with charoset and horseradish and experienced many other Jewish traditions.
